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VENTANA BIG SUR

Big Sur is back on the scene in a big way after last year's massive landslides closed a good portion of the coastline to the public for several months. The Ventana Inn took the downtime to revamp and rebrand, reopening its doors to visitors as Ventana Big Sur (the first North American property for Alila Hotels & Resorts), just as the new Pfeiffer Canyon Bridge was unveiled in October. Perched on the bluffs above the Pacific Ocean, the property retains all of its original character—stone fireplaces, cedar-planked interiors, luxury bathtubs, and private balconies and patios—while boasting new rustic-chic design elements including rich leather furnishings, cozy bedding and handcrafted accessories. Fiftynine quest rooms get the custom treatment with macramé wall hangings by renowned Portland artist Holly Mueller and blackand-white photography of Big Sur's rugged landscape by Sonoma-based photographer Chere Pafford. "She hiked 15 miles in the coastal region with a Ventana guide to capture the perfect photos of Big Sur," says Rachel Fischbach, principal at Brayton Hughes Design Studios. The new Glass House Gallery, a 40foot shipping container repurposed with a glass-and-cedar-slat façade and outdoor viewing deck, showcases work by a rotating lineup of Central Coast artists, while the reimagined Social House encourages guests to linger. Think plush leather chairs for lounging, a vinyl record collection for listening and various game tables for playing. "We opened up the three existing lobby area rooms to create interesting spaces with a luxurious cabin vibe," Fischbach says. And if you're the type who likes an action-packed vacation, Ventana Big Sur also offers a host of activities—from treatments at the signature Spa Alila and soaking in the infinityedge hot tub to guided nature walks and energizing quartz bowl sound baths. ventanabigsur.com
